

**September 6, 2015 Twenty-third
Sunday in Ordinary time (B)**

From The Desk of Msgr. Corrigan:

On Monday at Barnes and Noble on Central Ave. I bought a copy of Pope Francis's encyclical letter "Laudato Si", subtitle "On care of our common home". It is not an easy read. He writes about many things and tries to link everything together. I am not a speed reader but I can read very fast. But I have to slow myself down to do justice to his thoughts and recommendations. He will have a tough time in the United States defending some of his statements. But I think that is good. It will make us stop and think about the issues. Keep in mind that the crucial decisions will be made in Paris in December.

I watched the HBO series on the desegregation case in Yonkers. I and many Catholic priests worked very hard to convince people not to oppose the court ordered settlement. It was a painful time. One thing I learned was to be careful about terminology. As a sociologist the words "social class" can mean many things to different people. Today it is best used as an economic term. "Lower class" should mean simply "low income". But to some it means bad behavior on the part of an individual or family e.g. "she is so low class". A better word for bad behavior is "dysfunctional". I was involved in the discussions of the screening process for those who would be allowed to enter the lottery to get one of those town houses on the east side. Terminology was all important. In the end the 200 units on the east side were a success because the vast majority of the families might have had lower income but they were not dysfunctional.

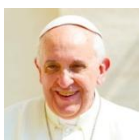
