

January 8, 2017 Epiphany of the Lord



From the Desk of Rev. Msgr. Hugh J. Corrigan:

Globalization, Technology and Climate Change are already changing our planet and the people who live on it. In the future these forces will be even more world-changing. The greater challenge for us is how to control these forces for the betterment (and not the destruction) of humanity.

Our feast today, the Epiphany, speaks to us today about “globalization”. This story in the gospel of Matthew was written to help the early Christians welcome the newcomers (non-Jews) into their community. This change in policy seems so obvious to us today that we can’t imagine how earthshaking it was for the first followers of Jesus. It is so easy to look back but it is very difficult to actually live during such changes. Our world is experiencing the beginnings of a worldwide shift in population. How we respond may determine the future of our planet.

I have been almost obsessed by the new discoveries in our universe. It is overwhelming to know that our universe contains billions of galaxies, each one containing billions of stars. Our sun is only one of these stars. Yet all these galaxies and stars are only 5% of the universe. The other 95% is either dark matter (25%) or dark energy (70%) of which we know very little. It is called “dark” because it doesn’t interact with light, is not made up of atoms and doesn’t carry any electric charge. The star of Bethlehem in today’s gospel reminds me why I keep searching the universe. Will I find empirical proof for the existence of God? I believe God exists but it would be wonderful if we found proof in the universe. If we ever do, it will be our star of Bethlehem.

Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12:

The magi from the east followed the star until it stopped still over the house. They entered, found the child with Mary, prostrated themselves, and did him homage.

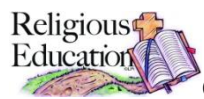
